A God-born Army

A God-born Army requires competent and godly leadership - leadership with clarity of vision and an evident anointing of the Spirit. Discerning and affirming the leader to take the movement forward with a certainty of direction is the task of the High Council. In fact, its only task. Who emerges as the General for this time is not only a matter of interest, but of critical importance to every Salvationist. True, in the event, a body of 120 or so men and women will be required to speak for an Army of 1,000,000 and more Salvationists around the world. But they are informed, experienced and spiritually sensitive leaders from every command and territory. They are Independent in their judgments. We are praying that in the intensely spiritual atmosphere in which they will meet this chosen body will know the mind of the Spirit.

Does this matter to those of us who are ordinary Salvationists caught up in the ministries of our local corps? Indeed, it does. There is much at stake that touches the life of every corps and every soldier. Who we are and what are we called to be and do in our lost and troubled world - beginning with the opportunities right before us wherever we are. How do we and how will we understand our mission and purpose? And what should be our priorities in fulfilling that mission?

The General plays a key role in determining and promoting our understanding of all this and so much more.

- The General represents us. The General has a major role in setting the spiritual tone for the Army.
- The General guards the doctrinal integrity of the Army
- The General has a fiscal responsibility for the Army.
- The General selects or approves top leadership in the Movement.
- The General is both a symbol of our unity as a worldwide movement but actively promotes it.
- The General is charged with maintaining the legacy, guiding the mission, and pointing the future of the Movement.

In all this the General serves both as CEO and spiritual leader.

Few churches or missions come close to putting the measure of authority and influence in the hands of their leaders as does the Army. It is all the more critical that we join in a global concert of prayer for God's guidance to be granted the members of the High Council as they seek to know the mind of the Lord in identifying the person to be our global leader.

No one 'runs' for the Generalship. It is not a political objective to be sought. If nominated, one can choose to stand for election or not. It is a task, a heavy mantle of responsibility one is called and chosen to accept. In all the proceedings of the Council and the pre-Council program the members give themselves to recognizing the person with oil on their brow and fire in their heart whom God has chosen and anointed for this hour.

The Council needs — requires the mobilization of our prayer power around the Army world focused on these critical days in May as the High Council convenes. We can be a part of this. Our prayer participation matters. Helpful materials have been prepared and regular bulletins will be made available. What will you and I do?

Awaken

A comfortable and adored bride. Asleep in the night, though she must have been waiting for him as the lantern was still lit. She was warm and comfortable in the security of her bed. However, she was unwilling to respond to the call of her lover who had been in the dark of the night, his head heavy with the wet dew.

She yearned for the intimacy and closeness of her lover, but He was calling her to leave the warmth and comfort of her bed. He was calling her to a more mature understanding of what it was to love Him and to be his partner. He was calling her to share His suffering with Him.

She waited too long to respond, and He left without her. Too late she awakened to His call. She went out without Him, and the cost was heavier than what it could have been had she opened the door to Him right away. No matter what should have been, her Lover loved her enough to not give up on her and, she, in her way, loved Him enough to repent of her complacency.

The body of Christ is in a season where Jesus is awakening His church. He wants His church to mature in her love for Him. He is calling us to a deeper understanding of His love. Jesus is standing at the door of our hearts, knocking. He is trying to open the latch, but it has been locked and He cannot enter. There are two potential reasons why we have locked the doors of our hearts to Him:

The first being His calling the body of Christ to seek Him, to share in the fellowship of His suffering; to be willing to leave the comfortable places; to risk all for the sake of Him. The Salvation Army has a vast history of being willing to lay down her life for the call of Christ and go into the darkest places of the earth. She has won many battles and continues to do so. However, I would argue that she has grown comfortable. She has grown comfortable behind her building walls and behind the walls of organization and hierarchy. Jesus is calling The Salvation Army to awaken to her first love. He is calling her to come alive once again and be reminded of her first and most important call, to Him.

Or it could be that the door that Jesus is knocking on is more intimate. The door could represent areas of our hearts that have yet to be opened to the loving, and healing presence of the Father. As full-time ministry leaders, the demand to give more than is being received can be overwhelming and often louder than the knocking of the lover of our souls. Sometimes, Jesus wants to take us in the recesses of our hearts that are the darkest, most hidden, unseen places. He seeks entry, but they are locked, with signs that say, "Do Not Enter." These are places long forgotten or buried under layers of dust and dirt, covered up by the stress and chaos that ministry brings. It is a door that is too scary to open because who knows what lies behind, who knows what darkness is waiting to surface and how do I even have time to deal with the pain. However, it is in these places that Jesus wants to deepen our trust of Him and He wants these places to be full of light and a garden of abundance. He wants ministry to pour through us in a fresh and new way. He is inviting us into the recesses of our hearts but are we too comfortable in our fear and

our apathy? As we allow Jesus into these places, He brings freedom, He makes streams in the wilderness.

Jesus, you are the WAY, the TRUTH, the LIFE. You stand at the door and knock on the doors of our hearts, our churches. You long to enter in and seek to share your sufferings (Phil 3:8-12) with us. I pray that we will awaken and respond to the sound of Your voice. To the sound of your hand trying to unlatch the bolts on our heart. Make a way for us through this dark night that is to come upon us.

Jesus is calling His bride to awaken. Listen for His voice. Allow Him to wake you from your slumber. Respond to the call to step out of what is comfortable, what you know. Seek Him while He may be found. He is longing for a BRIDE. A Mature Bride, who will walk beside Him in humility, in Power and in His glory. Rise up from the ashes of defeat and loss. Break through the fear and the complacency that has wrapped its tentacles around your souls. He has the power. He has gained the victory. Death is no more. The power of sin and death is not our inheritance. Complacency and compromise are our prisons, not our defense. Allow Him to do the work He wants to do in our hearts and in our church.

He is calling us to search the heart. Take the time.

Start off by meditating on these scriptures:

Philippians 3:8-12 Song of Solomon 5:2-8 Revelation 3:20

As you wait for Him, pay attention to the words standing out to you as you read.

- Write them down.
- Take the time to ask Him what they mean to you.
- What is He saying to you, personally? Dig deep and take the time to fully grasp what it is He is speaking.

Here are a few other questions that might be good to ask as well:

- What door is He knocking on?
- Where have you been resistant/complacent in responding to His voice?
- Where and how do I repent?
- What is one thing I can do to move toward His guidance?

When thinking about the Salvation Army today, 1 Corinthians 12:26 comes to mind, "If one part suffers, every part suffers with it...".

There is no way to ignore the malaise affecting officers in recent years: many of us are burnt-out, overwhelmed, and disenchanted. Quite a few have handed in their resignation. How do we go forward?

The body is suffering and at the same time there is as big a need as ever, if not more, for covenanted warriors to serve suffering humanity in His name. The forced standstill caused by the pandemic was in many ways an opportunity to pause and regroup and yet, our need to be Martha saw us galloping ahead relentlessly.

God's desire was to "allure [the Salvation Army]" and "lead her into the wilderness and speak tenderly to her" (Hosea 2:14): "Martha, Martha... you are worried and upset about many things, but few things are needed—or indeed only one" (Luke 10:41). "Return to Me," declares the LORD Almighty, 'and I will return to you." (Zechariah 1:3).

In trying to keep up with trends, statistics, reputation, and donors a huge burden has been put on the new generation of officers. We were called to be shepherds in the wilderness, led by the Spirit to become 'all things to all people', walking closely and intimately with Jesus under His yoke and we find ourselves instead like hamsters in a wheel, torn between our calling and the expectations of our leaders. Praying At Noon

From our earliest days as a movement, it was the expectation for Salvationists worldwide to intercede on behalf of the General each day at noon. While this is more less an Army tradition, it holds deep biblical support. The imperative is given in 1 Thessalonians 5:12-13, 17: "Brothers and sisters, we ask you to respect those who are working with you, leading you, and instructing you. Think of them highly with love because of their work. Live in peace with each other. Pray continually."

These verses are used by Commissioner Bronwyn Buckingham, as she calls the Army world to prayer for the leaders who will be called to the High Council in May of this year for the purpose of electing a new General of The Salvation Army. Beyond this important call, however, these words from the apostle Paul to the church in Thessalonica are a reminder to us all that we are to keep our spiritual and ecclesiastical leaders at the top of our prayer lists because of the highly important role they play in our lives. Without our spiritual leaders, we would be like leaves on an autumn tree, barely attached to the branch through which we draw our spiritual nourishment. To this end, our prayers for them, in all respect and love are to be for their perseverance to the Gospel and their own strong connection to the true vine, Christ Jesus.

In John 15, Jesus paints for us a word picture that provides vivid detail to the vine and branch imagery. This is the hope we should have for our Salvation Army leaders – that they remain in Christ so that he will remain in them, thereby spiritually enabled to produce fruit that is long-lasting and lifegiving. We are the beneficiaries of such leadership. As Salvation Army leadership convenes during those sacred days in May, would you join with fellow Salvationists, praying that the connection to the true vine is so deep and inextricably linked that our leaders would be able to, as Jesus says, "ask anything [they] want, and it will be given..." (John 15:7). We recognize that when truly connected to the vine, our leaders will not be asking for anything born of their own will, or even of their constituents, for that matter, but the will of the Father, who knows exactly what the Army needs and what the world needs of his Army in these days.

Would we all be so connected to the vine so that we could pray along with our poet General. Albert Orsborn:

All my work is for the Master, He is all my heart's desire; O that He may count me faithful In the days that try by fire! (SASB #672)

May that also be the prayer of our leaders as they follow Christ and lead The Salvation Army!
